### STANDARDS

One of the most difficult things that your Association does is the updating and rewording of our camp standards that are used as a guide for all of us and for the O.C.A. visitations.

For the past two years now the Standards Committee, under the leadership of Barb Gilbert, has been working to try and reword some of the existing standards to make them a little more clear and, as well, to bring in a few new standards which were felt by the committee to be needed. Some of the explanations were out of date or incomplete and thus the committee has worked hard to try and bring these standards more in line with the changes over the next few years.

In the next few weeks everyone will be "DRAFT PROPOSAL" from the receiving a Standards Committee. It will he of distributed to every member our Association so that everyone, should they wish, will have input into the changes. The following steps will be followed so that everyone will have a full opportunity for input and discussion before any final ratification.

1. Every member shall receive a draft copy of the entire proposal.

- 2. The draft copies will be accompanied by a comment sheet. Should you have any suggestions after reading the proposed standards, these sheets would have to be filled in and returned to the committee by September 1, 1989. This will allow the committee ample opportunity to review your comments and to make any appropriate changes.
- 3. All camps who are going to be visited this summer will complete answer sheets for both booklets... that is, one for the present standards and one for the proposed new standards. In this way the committee will be able to compare and make any changes that are felt to be necessary.
- 4. In the fall, the Standards Committee will make a final presentation to the Board for their consideration.
- 5. Should the Board accept the final recommendation, (a) every member would receive a copy of the final recommendation, and (b) the Board would establish a process for a ratification vote by the end of December.

Any changes that you find in the Introduction to the proposed standards have been changed according to our new Constitution.

Please remember the prime importance of Standards Visits is to allow for a sharing of ideas, discussions of common concerns and an opportunity for each camp director to assess his or her own program and practices.

The Standards Committee in the thinking through of its proposals has taken into account that every situtation is unique and different and that what may be right for one camp is wrong for another, so that a "no" answer to a standard does not mean that anyone has failed or that you do not belong. There are lots of reasonable explanations to "no" answers.

The Standards Committee looks forward to everyone's input by September 1. Please read the proposals carefully and help make all O.C.A. camps safer, healthier and a little bit better for all of us.

### LET'S INTEGRATE TOGETHER!

DISCOVER YOUR POTENTIAL Prepared by: A.C. Grossman Submitted by: Cathy Smart, Integration Chairperson

Camp Brebeuf is one of the few residential camps where the goal for its disabled campers is total integration. Even there, where the one-to-one program, one counsellor is assigned to one special needs child, is relatively new. In previous years, approximately 150 campers were present during one session of camp out of which only one child was disabled. However, during 1988 there were six special needs children per camp session. Consequently, the one-to-one program was born and was proven successful.

### Why integration?

What are the benefits of sending a disabled child to an integrated camp, such as Camp Brebeuf, versus a segregated camp? The parents of the one-to-one campers were all positive that integration was the key to an enjoyable learning experience for their children. Many parents openly put down segregation, stating that they believed their children should learn to deal with the disabled. Since children learn best from their peers, it is hoped that when integrating a disabled child with other children of the same age group, he or she will learn appropriate behaviour from them.

In order to function successfully in the community, one must have a method of communication that is easily understood by others. Often, disabled children with communication problems rely on their parents or teachers to translate what they are saying to others. At Camp Brebeuf, away from everyone who knows them, these children are forced to make themselves understood without the help of a translator. Thus, they become more independent and gain the self-confidence and social skills needed for dealing with the outside world.

However, the benefits of integration at Camp Brebeuf were not meant to be only for the disabled children. It was a goal of the camp to educate all campers about the disabled in the community. Through living with a special needs child for one camp session, the other campers learned to be more sensitive to the problems of the disabled. They learned how to treat their disabled peers and most importantly, they realized the wide range of abilities that any disabled person does have.





### PUBLIC POOLS

Regulation to Amend Ontario Regulation 381/84 Made Under the Health Protection and Promotion Act 1983 (Public Pools)

I am bringing to your attention that there have been revisions to the regulations governing public pools. The new regulation became law on January 1, 1989 and is called O. Reg. 569/88.

A letter from D.J. Porter, Senior Consultant, Public Health Service, has been received and covers the following points:

"The Regulation revokes the construction requirements for public pools set out in Part II of the Public Pools Regulation (O. Reg. 381/84). These requirements are being incorporated into the Ontario Building Code and are to be administered by the Ministry of Housing...

"While at first glance there may appear to be amendments to Part I of O.Reg. 381/84, these are only minor transpositions and adjustments caused by the split between construction and operational components of the current Regulation. The operational requirements remain the same and continue to be administered by the Ministry of Health and applied by the 43 local official health agencies serving throughout Ontario. Arrangements have been made to have copies of the amended public pools requirements reprinted."

### MORE SALES TAX INFO

Our December Newsletter article on Sales Tax requires this little addendum concerning a camper's length of stay. We hope this, in conjunction with the December information, clarifies the issue:

For a camper who stays less than a month, the Retail Sales Tax is 5% of 60% of the total charge (that is, 3% of the total fee). For a camper who stays a month or more, the Retail Sales Tax payable is 7% of meals only, if meals are listed separately on the bill. Otherwise, the tax is 5% of 60% of the total charge (that is, 3% of the total fee).

### ADMISSION OF FOREIGN CAMP COUNSELLORS - 1989

Final negotiations with Health and Welfare Canada have confirmed that the medical requirement for the admission of foreign camp counsellors for 1989 will be more stringent than in the past.

The Ministry maintains that a number of camps did not comply with the terms of the more relaxed protocol of 1988 and 1987 and therefore the requirement will be stricter for this summer.

The full protocol will be sent to all Camps as soon as a letter of confirmation is received from Ottawa.

Meanwhile all Camps should be advised that they should begin to hire any foreign staff immediately as the process for 1989 will take from three to six weeks for each foreign staff member.

### LET'S INTEGRATE TOGETHER!

A couple of years ago a number of interested O.C.A. members who work with Special Needs populations decided to form an Integration Committee.

The primary focus of the committee was to support and encourage the concept of integration within already established camp settings. In addition, the committee was to act as a resource for those who were interested in integration, but were not too sure how to go about it.

The Integration Committee is currently recognized as a sub-committee of the Education Committee. Cathy Smart sits on the Education Committee acting as the Integration representative.

Because the whole idea of integration is still relatively foreign to many Camp Directors and owners, on-going articles will be printed in every future newsletter. The purpose of LET'S INTEGRATE TOGETHER is primarily to act as a source of information for already established camps regarding the world of disabled individuals.

### SOME UNFITTING REMARKS ABOUT PARC

Did you know that the percentage of Canadian youth reaching recommended fitness levels drops dramatically from a 96% level at age 13 to 40% by the end of adolescence? Did you know that the current physical condition of teenage girls is inferior to that of boys? Or did you know that only <u>6%</u> of youth ages 10-19 are active regularly and vigorously enough to obtain lasting benefits?

That's only three of many reasons why PARC was implemented a year ago. PARC - a joint CCA/Fitness Canada project - is taking an active leadership role in increasing both the quantity and quality of physical activity in Canadian camps. Why? Because children who engage in vigorous physical activity become more active adults - encouraging and reinforcing a life-time of health benefits and "...become more active in their free time and during summer vacations. They are happier and become more confident individuals" (CAPHER).

Last spring PARC mailed OCA member camps: 1) "Survey Highlights" of physical activity at Canadian camps, 2) Four colour posters, 3) Two "HOW-TO" booklets. In a few months two more of these booklets should be released and on the way to OCA members. I invite you, and your camp, to share your ideas and past successes regarding physical activity programs or innovations. What are your needs and expectations from PARC? What kinds of resources would be valuable to you? If PARC workshops were offered, from what kind of content would you and your staff benefit the most?

Last fall, on Oct. 21, the PARC Advisory Committee convened for three days within the cozy confines of the Family Services' Bolton Conference Centre, representing all regions of the country and most provinces. Current objectives and priorities were evaluated and an updated action plan resulted. I invite you to participate and share in this worthwhile project. PARC needs YOUR input and feedback.
