Bring the wealth of the out-of-doors to more people. Your camp residence could extend its facility use beyond the summer months. School groups could use it for outdoor education purposes. Other organizations might enjoy having a place to get together and conduct their own sessions. What must you consider to initiate such programs?

Both Use of Resident Camps for School Programs and Outdoor Education Guidelines for Camps provide concise lists of the pertinent considerations. By looking at your available resources, staffing and the administrative aspects, you can assess whether or not such programs could be possible at your campsite.

Other C.C.A. publications which focus on the year-round aspect, are some of the inexpensive Fund for Advancement of Camps papers. Namely, Year-Round Camping Through Adventure Education Programs, Youth Development through Outdoor Adventure Programs, and Whatever Happened to School Camping. They will provide you with an idea of the kinds of programs which can be developed at your campsite. The next issue of BETWEEN THE COVERS will focus on program resource books for outdoor education.
