## DOREEN HOPKINS

Doreen Hopkins died on June 12, 1980, but she lives on in the hearts and minds of thousands of campers, counsellors and parents with whom she has come into contact with at Bayview Glen Day Camp (and the Junior Schools). Doreen was a member of the Ontario Camping Association, the Canadian Camping Association, the American Camping Association and a member of the Society of Camp Directors as well as many other associations relating to education and atypical children. She was one of the first members and chairpersons of the O.C.A. Day Camp Committee. When Doreen founded Bayview Glen Junior Schools and Day Camp in 1962 there were only three bungalow type rooms on the four and a half acre site in the seclusion of the Don Valley at Bayview and Lawrence in Metropolitan Toronto. Under her direction the organization has grown tremendously. now 600 pupils in the school, about 1,300 campers each summer in the Day Camp, a fleet of over 30 buses, 5 swimming pools and many new buildings. From the outset "The Glen" was a special place for children. All children between the age 2 and 12 were welcomed, accepted, and integrated into regular groups and programmes. Many blind, deaf, physically disabled, emotionally disturbed and other "special children" have joined with so-called normal children in almost all regular activities. These children have learned a great deal from each other. The many preschool campers have had a regular camp programme especially adapted to their needs. Despite all the difficulties involved Doreen insisted on providing half day programme options to better meet the needs of campers and parents. As in all other areas "impossible" was not in her vocabulary. It was her belief that day camping provided both an excellent complement to the regular educational process and provided perfect preparation for resident camp. As the director of both a school and camp she was in a rare position of being able to see and utilize the strong relationship between the two. A day camp was to be a camp and not a playground. Children of all ages stayed on overnights in tents, went on cook-out hikes, learned archery, camporaft and the like. loved children and devoted all her waking hours to learning about them and helping them to learn and grow. The became personally involved in the lives of thousands of children and was always a constant source of philosophy and inspiration to parents and staff. She was happiest with an office full of campers when she dressed up as a favourite character (Dorothy in Oz, the Queen of Hearts, Mother Goose, a mermaid in the pool, an old Indian story teller at campfires)on special days. Doreen's dream of maintaining the valley as a very special place for all campers Her last wish was that a non-profit foundation be will be realized. formed - and her husband John and sister Valerie are now overseeing this process. She has left us all the legacy of a life of service to children and a recognition of the truth of the motto of the Glen: -

"....AS THE TWIG IS BENT - SO THE TREE IS INCLINED." (Alexander Pope).
