## O.C.A. - C.O.E.O. RESIDENTIAL OUTDOOR EDUCATION CONFERENCE

The Ontario Camping Association and the Council of Outdoor Educators of Ontario are officially co-operating in the sponsorship of a conference/workshop on Residential Outdoor Education. This gathering has the goal of "bringing together those individuals in Ontario most interested in residential education for development of themselves, their programs, and the outdoor education field in general". It is being designed for those actively working at residential outdoor education centres and extended season camps, for teacher-leaders of residential outdoor education experiences, and for administrators of such programs. Program material will be aimed at those already immersed in the joys and frustrations of residential work. Program content will include administrative and organizational topics, such as: costing, ensuring proper lead-up, on site responsibilities of staff, who will be the users/clients of the future?

## "CANOE '79"

# O.C.A. and THE NIAGARA ESCARPMENT

The Niagara Escarpment plays a major role in the activities of many of our member camps and many of our individual lives. The O.C.A. is concerned that this great feature of our province not be lost to poor development and needless resource or recreational exploitation. In response to our concern we have submitted a brief to the Niagara Escarpment Commission which makes the following recomendations:

- 1 The Niagara Escarpment is a <u>Provincial Resource</u> of significance to <u>all</u> the people of Ontario. It must be comprehensively planned and can only be done so by the Niagara Escarpment Commission, not by the fifty-five affected local municipalities.
- 2 When a Niagara Escarpment Plan is finally adopted it must be administered by a Provincial Agency which has complete planning and development responsibility in the Escarpment area and has the <u>power</u> to enforce the implementation.
- 3 Recreation Policies should remain substantially as given in the "Preliminary Proposals".
- 4 The Bruce Trail must be protected by the Government so that a continuous footpath from Queenston to Tobermory is accessible to the people of Ontario in perpetuity.

#### ARCHIVES REPORT

I trust you will be interested in a bit of history and facts concerning the O.C.A. Archives . . .

- initiated in 1966 as a Centenary project, the Committee had as its first Chairman, Dr. Mary L. Northway. The original members of the Committee were: Margaret Govan, Adele Ebbs, Barry Lowes, Elizabeth Raymer, Flora Morrison, Elsie and Dave Palter, Blackie Blackstock, Stan Wild, Joyce Bertram, Charles Plewman and Kirk Wipper.
- since its inception, the Archives Committee has been able to carry its own financial load because Dr. Northway proposed that the royalties received from the Camp Counsellor's Book, edited by Mary Northway and Barry Lowes, be

be used for this purpose; permission was granted by the O.C.A. Board to use such royalties. This fund made it possible for \$500.00 to be forwarded to the Trent University Archivist, Ken Johnson, so that a student, Paul White, could be employed to work on the O.C.A. Archives during the summer of 178

- in '68, Shirley Hall was employed to catalogue the material in the Archives, housed at the O.C.A. Office before its transfer to Trent University, the permanent home of the O.C.A. Archives.
- on October 22nd, 1969, the collection of Archives was presented by John Latimer, the President of O.C.A., to Miss Patricia Johnston, the Archivist, and was accepted by the President, Dr. Tom Symons, on behalf of Trent University.
- It was established at the meeting held in May, 1978 at Trent University and attended by Adele Ebbs, Elwood Jones, Bruce Hodgins, Ken Johnson and Helen Stewart, that the O.C.A. Archives at Trent University should include the following types of records:
  - organizational records of the O.C.A. which represent its activities as a corporate entity and are thought to be a archivally important.
  - 2. the "records of camping" acquired on a laissez-faire basis from member camps. These might consist of a complete archival collection of an individual member camp but normally this component of the Archives would include records presented by individuals or camps and selected for preservation by the Trent University Archives, from among the following types of records: brochures, personal diaries, annual reports, auditors' reports, business minutes (when open), samples of business forms, camp hymn or song books, camp newspapers, unique records of special events such as oral history tape recordings, photographs and negatives or distinctive memorabilia.

Because of the \$500.00 grant, 85% of the O.C.A. Material had been inventoried by the end of August, 1978. Once the final cataloguing has been accomplished, a finding aid and the records will be made available for research.

The present member of the O.C.A. Archives Committee are: Adele Ebbs, Bruce Hodgins and Ken Johnson, further recruits are needed for a future project so kindly leave your name and telephone number for me at the O.C.A. Office.

Mrs. Nora Robinson of the O.C.A. Office Staff is faithfully adding pertinent data to her box marked "Archives" for which I am very grateful. I have made the same request of the Membership in several OCAsional Newsletters but, to date, only a few have acknowledged such. Please remember . . . I can only produce IF you produce. Don't let your camp history gather dust and fade into oblivion.

AFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 1979, the Red Cross fee increases to .75 (seventy-five cents) per candidate evaluated at Junior, Intermediate and Senior levels and levels 3-6 Adapted Aquatics.

Please note that the Red Cross fee is used for the development and maintenance of the Water Safety Service and <u>DOES NOT</u> cover the cost of the certification cards and crests.

IN JUNE 1978 AN OPEN LETTER was addressed to all Directors and Waterfront Directors requesting feedback and evaluations of Ontario Aquatic services.

Thank you very much to the camps who took the time and effort to respond. The availability of information regarding programs within the Association will be of great help to the Committee. Resulting from the information, suggestions and requests submitted in the form of an Aquatics Report, a questionnaire will be designed to further ensure that this communication continues.

<u>PROGRESSIVE EVALUATION OF Junior Red Cross candidates occurred in selected programs during the summer months with permission of the Area Supervisor. Due to the diversity of standards encountered, September I, 1978, all Junior programmes will be evaluated by a Red Cross appointed Water Safety Evaluator.</u>
