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DRAMA IN CAMPING

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This is one of the summer programmes for camps being initiated by the Province of Ontario under the title "Experience'74". The O.C.A. was asked to suggest programmes which would be of assistance to our camps and, at the same time, would give employment opportunities to young people. "Drama in Camping" was one of four suggestions. A Co-ordinator and eight assistants will be hired and then work on a programme which can be presented to camps during the summer. Applications for the positions are available to the deadline date, April 15th.

A committee from O.C.A. will screen and interview applicants; programme will be co-ordinated from Miss Dorothy Walter's office, Sports and Recreation Bureau. She has asked that if any camp directors or a staff person is interested in the interviewing committee, please let her know, at 965-5665.

0.C.A. will be advised as soon as the coordinator has been hired. Directors will be asked to indicate whether or not they wish one of the Drama in Camping teams to visit camp this summer for a demonstration. Programme will run from mid-June to mid-August, and is funded through the Sports and Recreation Bureau, Ministry of Community and Social Services.

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ADDITIONAL INFORMATION RECEIVED FOR NEWSLETTER

Things meaning progress, changes, improvements, time-savers, new innovations have been suggested lately at Board Meetings as being necessary to the survival of the Association; this, through greater involvement of a larger number of members in committee work. President Jack Pearse took the initiative and arranged a week-end Joint Meeting of the Advisory Board and Directors to tackle some of the areas under question, to bring them into the open, make recommendations after discussion and take action after approval.

No week-end of rest and relaxation, this! Sessions commenced at 8.30 a.m., coffee breaks at the conference table, minimum time for meals, sessions again from 7.30 p.m. to name-the-hour. Work we did. But it was necessary in order to prepare for acceptance at the next regular Board Meeting.

BOARD STRUCTURE

Priority was given to our Board Structure and the number of meetings held each year. Recommendations: that the Board of Directors will now be made up of thirteen people, seven of whom are to be elected members; the two exofficio members will be a representative from the Provincial Government and the Editor of OCAcasional News. Members-at-Large will be entitled to a vote and will be members of the Executive. This group is to meet as often as necessary to carry out the policies of the O.C.A. Also, the Advisory Board will hold one two-day meeting for the orientation of new members, with at least two additional meetings during the year for matters of business.

BE PREPARED TO WORK FOR OCA

Ours is known as a working Association rather than one for Joiners Only. A condition of membership requires a membership fee. An additional condition of membership now calls for a personal commitment of time, energy and talent as well as the existing financial commitment. FUNDS - HOUSEKEEPING - ACCOUNTING

A major portion of the Conference became, in reality, a Think Tank, with all members pooling ideas for the ultimate growth of this Association. The general consensus was that money must be raised in one way or another; with alternate choices of decreasing services or charging for them. It was agreed that, a) we attempt to become independent of Government funds to insure continued growth; b) that sources of outside funds must be investigated. To this end it was suggested, and has now been approved, that a sub-group be formed to investigate such sources of funding for the Association, i.e. through foundations, insurance companies, banks, industrial institutions, suppliers, etc. Suggestions will be welcome.

First: that Ron Johnstone be supported by Ontario in the vote for CCA Vice-President at the CCA Annual Meeting in St. John's, Newfoundland (postponed due to the airstrike until Fall).

Second: that Kirk Wipper be the Ontario Representative to attend the CCA Board of Directors Meeting in St. Johns on April 24th to 27th.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION - NATURE SCHOOL

Another reminder to all members that these two Conferences will be held in Quebec, October 3 to 6. John Russell and the Outdoor Education Committee were asked to select seven Ontario delegates who will conduct Provincial Conferences following the Conference in Quebec.

Note from John Russell on the above:

The Canadian Camping Association will host a national Outdoor Education and Nature School Conference beginning at noon on Thursday, October 3 and running to noon on Sunday, October 6, 1974. The conference will be held at a resort by the name of "LA CALECHE" in the Laurentians under the chairmanship of Bob Cameron (N.B.) and Lorne Brown (B.C.) and Paul Dampier (B.C.).

The number of delegates has been limited by provinces and, under the rules set out by C.C.A., Ontario is able to have seven representatives attend. We would like to have our delegates selected by May 20 so that if you are interested in attending this conference please let us know right away.
