Sharing Nature With Children is a natureawareness guidebook. Through its 142 games for children and adults, nature speaks to us as the teacher. We experience learning situations as activities take on a scientific slant, artistic look or a mystic adventure.

The content of the book is divided up into a number of activity sections: Close-up With Nature, How Much Can You See?, Nature's Balance, Learning is Fun, Play and Discovery, Spotting and Attracting Animals, Adventures.

A guide to good teaching is included and a quick-reference chart for each game identifies: basic mood (calm, active, energetic), concepts being taught, when and where to play, number of players needed, best age range and special materials needed.

To directly touch, smell, taste, see and hear nature, the world around us comes alive!
