As the arrival of our campers is fast approaching, I thought it valid to be reminded of the expectations of our parents.

Dear Camp Director,


One cold winter evening several months ago, you came to my home and shared pictures and stories of your camp with me and my child. I remember how excited we were! We talked about camp adventures on many occasions after your visit.

In a few short weeks you will be welcoming onto your property your first campers of the 1987 season. My child will be among them! As we prepare for camp together we are once again talking about sailboats and sailboards. Her expectations for camp are simple, sincere and enthusiastic. She expects to have fun! My expectations are sincere, enthusiastic and not as simple. I expect my child to have fun, in an environment that is supervised 24 hours a day. Not a rigid environment but one that offers a good balance between routine and opportunity for choices. I expect my child to be nurtured by staff who are hired for their respect and understanding of children first and their camping accomplishments second. I expect my child to understand and respect the camp rules because they have been made to ensure her safety and will be thoroughly explained to her. I expect my child's tuck account not to exceed the suggested amount sent in advance. She will be bringing to camp all of the clothing and sundry items suggested on your camper list. I do not expect her to purchase costly items through peer pressure or camp "loyalty". I expect my child to learn new skills and to refine present skills through the activities offered at camp. I expect through the opportunity of group living together with guidance from her counsellor that she will learn through life skills sharing, experience, of co-operation and thinking of others. These skills are perhaps most important of all. These social skills may carry over into every day living and be an asset long after the physical skill of executing the perfect cross bow rudder or swan dive is forgotten. I expect in your unique setting for my child to have an opportunity to experience the gloriousness of a sunrise, the wonderment of star gazing, the satisfaction of cooking over an open fire, and the adventure of sleeping Through these activities that are out. unique to summer camp I expect my child to develop an appreciation of nature.

I expect you and your staff to meet my expectations. I expect my child to have fun!

I sincerely wish you and your staff a happy, . healthy, best-ever summer!

Those of us who had a hand in shaping our History thought we Knew It All, with each preparatory chapter well in hand until Dr. Mary Northway's eagle eye came to rest on our original scripts.

She it was who had had in mind for years a History of children's camping and the part played by O.C.A. In her kindly but vigilant way she prodded our committee to Get On With It, urging us to put facts on paper as they occurred, while our Originals were with us and could offer accurate contributions. She encouraged interviews with this group, to stress authentic happenings and developments as they were, rather than only figments of today's imaginations. In proof-reading she kept us to those facts, as they were, not hearsay or probabilities.

Just as Mary was the guiding light behind Child Study, Research in Outdoor Education as well as School Camping, she took time to read our material after piloting other topics that would be invaluable to future generations of students and directors; not through articles written by herself alone, but rather, jointly, with those she felt deserved credit through their experiences.

Actually, if it hadn't been for her persistence and drive, our Archives would be sadly lacking a true recorded History of the whole children's camping movement. As it stands, it enjoys honoured presence in Public Reference Libraries as well as on the shelves of history enthusiasts.

But that was our Mary Northway. We shall miss her.
