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A summer of positive sharing

s I watched the slide show at our final Banquet before Section Fires and Cabin Good-nights, I was struck, not for the first time but still quite profoundly, by the number of things that went on this summer that I was seeing for the first time. This is probably a familiar thing for most directors - being the last person to discover some things at Camp - but I wasn't all that upset by the things I saw.

There was a camper who, I remembered, had been afraid of the water on the first day. She was in the middle of a swim relay. There was the pair of campers who had weathered a social crisis and here appeared as bosom pals. There was the staff member who had struggled with figuring out his 'place' at Camp this year and who turned in a stellar performance in the cabin project I saw on the screen. I was proud and thrilled that so much positive sharing had taken place in Camp this summer.

One of these many positive sharings involved a group of campers from another country. We participated in an international connection this summer with a Camp in Venezuela. Campin Rincon Grande is owned by Pedro Paredes, a member of the Steering Committee of the International Camping Fellowship. Ten campers and their leader came to Camp. Over the course of their stay, they shared their food, drink, songs, games, energy, enthusiasm, gifts and a love of camping that we all will long remember. Their final song and presentation at our Banquet, during which they spoke of all we had given them, left many of us wondering who had gained the most.

We rarely know the full extent of our impact.

Beyond our own Camps, as in past years, an army of volunteer Standards Visitors scheduled their time away from their own operations to support the Accreditation program of the OCA. More than ever, outside organizations, the public and the government itself have recognized the value and values of our program. The conscientious attention to the visits by busy camping personnel is an important contribution to our success.

The "Summer of Storms" left its mark, as well - in more ways than one. Many camps located in the wake of a series of big blows and twister-like storms had a quick program re-scheduling from regular activities to all-camp water hauling and brush removal. Many camps also received quick contact from other camps to offer support in the form of equipment or personnel. We can be proud of that sharing as well.

On a more personal note, Camp Ponacka experienced a close call this summer. A busload of campers making their way along Highway 11 incurred a tire blowout with a resultant rolling of the

vehicle into the ditch. Thankfully, everyone escaped from the bus. Add to that relief the timely arrival of Lance Barr from Hockey Opportunity Camp. Within a short time, the Ponacka campers and staff were safely at Hockey Opportunity Camp - fed an HOC meal, checked out by the HOC medical staff and relaxing within a caring HOC camp community. Don Bocking, the Morawetz', the campers and the staff at Camp Ponacka experienced some of the very best benefits of the greater camping community.

We often pray that the things we learn in Camp are reflected in the daily lives of our campers outside of Camp and in our own lives. The example of the Barrs and the staff & campers of Hockey Opportunity Camp makes me proud and thrilled to be associated with such fine people and such fine ideals.

In camping these kinds of things happen over and over again. I am proud and thrilled every time!

Caring for the young

rriving at our cottage for the May 24th weekend, we were delighted to see that a pair of birds had built a nest under our verandah eaves. The pair had picked a good spot - sheltered from Laurentian storms by our large, overhanging eaves and close to an abundant supply of insects. We watched as the two birds took turns sitting on the nest - equal opportunity in action. We envied their construction skills as the nest was perched on the narrow ledge of the screen trim, glued to the corner of the cottage wall and the roof beam and the rest cantilevered into space.

By the time we arrived at the cottage near the end of June, the eggs had hatched. With young to feed, the parents were busy catching insects and brining them to their offspring. Soon we could hear a little "cheep cheep' coming from the nest when the parents arrived with food as the young ones began to find their voices. Under the parents' direction, their days fell into a patterns of eating, chirping and resting.

As the young approached the pre-teen stage, we could see four heads sticking up out of the nest - a truly bonded group in that small space. The parents spent hours catching insects and feeding their hungry family. I decided to set up a ladder some distance away and, with the aid of our telephoto lens, try to capture the bird family on film. (Visions of the Photo Contest danced in my head.) Their Risk Management plans were in place. As long as I was on the ladder, the parents perched on the branches of the birch trees and tried to move my attention away from their nest. As soon as I descended to terra firma (and out of camera range), the feeding continued.

In a few weeks, little "cheeps" became louder and more insistent "chirps." The teens were asserting themselves. By the end of July, the parents were constantly on the move, providing for their demanding group. The young ones tested out their wings in the safe confines of the nest and chirped their impatience to join the adult world. A few days later, in the space of

less than an hour, they all flew out.

We've seen the young these past few weeks as they take their place in the adult world. I hope that those who cared for them are enjoying a well-deserved rest. Caring for the young is hard work.

The nest sits empty, waiting for next summer's group.

Recreational boating safety and its impact on camp

On June 15, 1995, a plenary meeting of the Joint Ontario/Transport Canada Working Group on Recreational Boating Safety was held. This group is investigating vessel licensing, operator proficiency and enforcement.

It has invited input from all interested parties. The report implicates the use of motorized vessels as well as sailboats, canoes, dinghies, etc. Without committing the group to formal support of the following recommendations, items under discussion for one or more categories of vessels include:

- · Increased support of Safe Boating Week
- Publication of Province Wide Speed Restriction
- Improved Safety Information Dissemination
- Consideration of Mandatory Usage Regulation for PFD's
- Expansion of Coast Guard Courtesy Examination Program
- Improve Overall Co-ordination of Boating Safety Programs

The Five Options available for consideration by the Task Group are:

- 1. Status Quo
- 2. Enhanced Status Quo
- 3. Mandatory Education/Training for Power Vessel Operators
- 4. Mandatory Education Training for All Vessel Operators
- 5. Full Operator Licensing

These options have some very real implications for Camps, although different Camps may have varying opinions on which is most appropriate for them. Public consultation is welcome and available in the City Council Chambers at 6:30 p.m. on the following dates in the following cities:

A video camera at the "Speakers Corner" recorded their camp stories, memories and anecdotes.

Through all of this came the recognition that individually and collectively this fine group had helped thousands of campers develop camping skills, greater self esteem and social skills that would not only provide them with memories that would last a lifetime, but would also make them productive members of society.

The event itself was wonderful. The planning was even more outstanding. Forty present and former camp leaders formed a steering committee and worked for two years to publicize the event in order to reach our alumni, plan the program, and actually carry it through. This group was so committed to the task and were so appreciative of the legacy camp had given them that they established The Camp Robin Hood Charitable Organization known as "Summer Dreams." They have encouraged their fellow alumni and friends to join this worthwhile group. Through annual dinners, donations, and other fund raising events, the Board of Directors of Summer Dreams intends to establish criteria to help campers with special needs and those unable to afford tuition attend an OCA accredited camp.
