

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# Jorg's Journal

Dear Journal:

April, 1995

During my time with the Archives Committee and since, I have marvelled at the contributions, vision and leadership of past OCA greats- many of whom are our Honourary Life Members. They set such a high standard of commitment and service beyond the running of their own successful camp operations that it is exhilarating to maintain the momentum they have created.

Bruno Morawetz said it very well (in 1962) when he spoke of Camp as "a little cosmos which springs to life suddenly in June and ends abruptly at the end of August. If this universe is a living reality, its vibrations will be felt throughout the intervening months and even through generations to come."

The OCA volunteer work is an interesting variation on that theme - a bigger cosmos springs to life in September and winding down in June with long-lasting vibrations and impact throughout the summer in Ontario and beyond (in the very camps which Bruno described.)

The OCA Action Plan defines this cosmos of Camping. It consists of our Mission Statement - "to enhance the quality of organized camping throughout Ontario"; our Goals - in Promotion, Professional Development, Advocacy, Standards and Operations; 41 specific Objectives and 113 clear, concrete action steps. It is these action steps (most of which we are already undertaking in some form) that provide signposts along a path leading to better camping in the next two years. The steps are distinct, project-based tasks perfectly suited for short term, and "in/out" participation by a team of volunteers.

I can hardly wait, Journal, to publish the results of the April Advisory Council's final look at the Action Plan. With the action steps set out for us, the volunteers can begin their work. The vibrations will be felt for generations to come...





# Breakfast Club targets integration

Welcome to the 90's, an attempt to break a new mode of camping throughout the Ontario Camping Association. It is referred to as integration, the coming together of able bodied and disabled campers to create summer camp. This was the main focus as we sat down to an OCA Breakfast Club courtesy of the Human Resources Committee, and the Integration Committee, hosted by Camp Towhee (Integra).

At this event of delightful exchange, we discussed how better we may accommodate the disabled child in our fine summer camps. Many of the camp directors who were in attendance favoured integration and welcomed suggestions for improving the concept of integration at their own facility.

Along with the welcoming of disabled campers, some directors expressed concerns about the matter. Some of the questions which arose were "how would parents react if their child was associating with a disabled one?" and, "how could a counsellor be in reach of a disabled camper at night if the counsellors do not sleep with the campers?" The group agreed that minor

adjustments could be made to accommodate these children. On the plus side, the members believed children belong with children no matter what their ability level. It should be noted that summer camp is a viable way for children to mature together, and all children of different abilities

should be granted a chance to attend.

The directors and staff in the camping field agreed this was a beneficial session and should be repeated in the future.

It is our intention that OCA Breakfast Clubs focusing on integration will open more doors to stronger debate on the subject and ultimately more opportunities for campers with disabilities.

# **Communications Systems**

Pagers are most advantageous

The technology of communication systems is becoming more affordable and helps reduce risks as well as enhancing the camps' ability to provide effective programs. In particular, day camps tend to be leaders in this field. A quick survey indicates that pagers, CB radios, VHF radios and cellular telephones are being used. Camps use these systems to facilitate emergency situations, daily arrivals and departures, rainy day programs and areas, out of camp trips, and communication between the camp office and important personnel or speciality and maintenance areas. The size of the camp in area and numbers, budget, the philosophical basis of the program and the expectation of the clientele, the area and topography of the site and out-trip locations determines the type of systems being used.

when trying to reach a specific person. They can be simple and beep, vibrate or can receive complete messages. Reception is within specific areas but it can be long distance.

We talked with Doug
McClintock of Motorola in
Toronto, a long-time friend of
camping, to determine the
difference between CB radios
and VHF radios. He
recognizes that CB (citizen
bands) are less expensive, have
specific ranges depending on
the power of the unit and are
especially useful for sites that
are flat, lack rock formations
and are away from trafficked
areas as the public has access
to the CB frequencies.

The VHF radio is more like an FM radio unaffected by topography and weather. Each system has its own frequency. The unit has a consistent 4-5 kilometre range and has unlimited ranges in the corridor through York Region to Lake Simcoe. These units can be rented for as little as \$60 per month.

Cellular Telephones have been especially important in urban areas and specific "corridors" where there are "cells." Many day camps send these units on out-trips or overnights away from the site. Some camps ask their transportation providers to have their drivers equipped with cellular phones instead of VHS radios.

OCA would like to compile as much information as possible on the use of communication systems in camps. At Camp Robin Hood, we depend heavily on the use of CB radios. If you use any system or systems, write to the OCA in care of "Communication Systems." Please describe the system), the approximate cost of purchase or rental, its uses and benefits to camp, its limitations and any comments or questions. We can all benefit from this information.
