W O R K M E N ' S C O M P E N S A T I O N W O E S

Camps that have received their Workmen's Compensation classification for 1993 may have noticed that camps have been reclassified in a category inconsistent with camping. This has resulted in a substantial rate increase.

The OCA has written a letter to Workmen's Compensation to object to the category our camps have been placed in, and feel that there are at least two other categories better suited to our operations: one is educational, and the other is recreational.

If you check the booklet you received in your notification package, you will note that you can object by completing Page 6. We strongly suggest you do so.

P R O P O S E D T R A N S M I S S I O N F A C I L I T I E S

Ontario Hydro has begun an environmental assessment study to recommend locations for new transmission facilities to improve the supply of electricity across a broad area of central Ontario.

New high voltage transmission lines are proposed between the Sudbury area and the north and east fringes of the greater Toronto urban area. New transformer or switching stations are also proposed northeast of the Toronto area to connect these lines into the existing transmission system.

The environmental study process is expected to continue for two and one half years before preferred route and site locations are identified. The study staff will meet with representatives of interested organizations to review all information. The decision on which new facilities, if any, are to be built and their location will be subject to a hearing by a Consolidated Hearings The planned in-Board service date for the initial facilities is 2002.
