FROM OUR PAST

The Archives Committee is concerned. It is trying to address the needs of a growing organization, to identify the forces and influences which shape the O.C.A. and to serve scholars and researchers who study camping.

The Committee is concerned that we are missing something. You can help.

The history of the Association as an organization is easy to assemble. All of the minutes of all of the meetings of all of the committees of the O.C.A. provide one picture of the Association. But, although those committees are made up of individual camps' leaders, what about those individual leaders' camps? How do we gather that history?

Someone in your camp is responsible for maintenance. Someone orders the buses or arranges transportation. Someone organizes the program. Someone bills the parents. Who, in your camp, gathers the written, printed, and photographic history of each year of operation? Without an archivist in your camp you must depend on oral history to piece together the past.

NEW STAFF PLACEMENT BUREAU OPENS AT O.C.A.

The Ontario Camping Association has improved its Staff Placement Bureau (formerly counsellor placement) and Directors will shortly start receiving a new computer printout listing all summer staff available and looking for jobs!

Each month, the Ontario Camping Association office will mail to member camps the current listing of available staff and it will no longer be necessary to keep editing previous lists. The new listing will show all of the staff presently available regardless of whether they are newly registered or on a previous month's list.

The way it works is this: All staff seeking work will register with the Staff Placement Bureau and their names will be automatically included in the next month's listing. In the last few days of each calendar month, if they have not yet obtained a job, they will call the O.C.A.'s 24-hour service number and ask to remain on the up-coming monthly listing (we have installed a special telephone line at the office which offers 24-hour O.C.A. answering machine service.) All of our listings will be entered in the office computer and printouts are, therefore, very simple to achieve.

To announce the new service, and the new Staff Placement Bureau telephone number (416-781-2767), we have prepared and mailed a special poster for bulletin boards, explanatory material and several application forms, to over 800 schools, colleges and universities in Ontario. There is a one time charge of \$5.00 to each job applicant and this will include all of their listings and services for the current season. (There is no charge, of course, to accredited camps for the monthly listings sheets).

Good luck in your hunt for good camp staff this summer, don't forget to let us know if you can see a way that the service can be further improved for future years.

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The Jeunesse et Sante of Belgium and the Ontario Camping Association has proposed a cooperative youth exchange where camp staff from our camps can host and be hosted by Ontario and Belgium. In the summer of 1985, a planning team, consisting of three Ontario representatives, will form the liaison team with the Belgium team. In July, the Belgium team will visit Ontario camps and the Ontario team will go to Belgium in August. The Ontario Camping Association invites those interested in being considered to become the third person on the team (joining Martin Hunt, O.C.A. and Dorothy Walter, Ministry of Tourism and Recreation), should write to the Liaison, Belgium/Ontario Exchange, at the O.C.A. office. Those interested must be available for the dates July 21-31 and August 10-20. A knowledge of French would be helpful. Although costs will be covered during the ten day visit to Belgium, a financial commitment may be expected.

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St. John Ambulance offers - Camp Course.

St. John Ambulance provides safety oriented first aid training, which is paid for by the W.C.B. St. John will train staff or counsellors in Toronto or at St. John locations throughout the province, during the months before camp opens. If 12 - 20 camp people are available at one time, St. John will organize a special class for them.

To qualify for payment camp operators need to fill out a W.C.B. form 0442 for approval of payment for training by the W.C.B. Once that approval is obtained, training can be organized.

Cardio pulmonary resuscitation training is also available from St. John Ambulance.
