TO: ALL COUNSELLORS AT CHILDREN'S CAMPS

FROM: THE ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS COMMITTEE OF ONTARIO CAMPING ASSOCIATION

SUBJECT: "YOU, THE CONSERVATIONIST"

At the O.C.A. Convention in March, considerable concern was expressed about the way people (not necessarily from our camps) were treating, or rather, mistreating, the areas in which so many camps must carry on their hiking, out-trip or overnight programmes.

At the same time a good many people, in the course of talks, speeches or whatever, stressed the fact that you counsellors were held in very high regard by the children at your camps and that the things you said, and did, were noted and very frequently imitated by them. Because of this we feel that you are in a position to perform a very valuable service for the whole camping movement.

If you can, by your actions, and your teachings, inculcate in these children: an appreciation of our natural habitat; a capacity to "enjoy and not destroy"; and the ability to curb any desires to pick, break off or dig up the many wonderful things with which nature surrounds us, you will be going a good way towards ensuring that - well - these things will continue to surround us. Furthermore, once learned these desirable traits should stay with them up to and through adulthood.

You have the ability to do this. You can devise, and sell, programmes which will stimulate the interest of the children. The Woodsman's Code (as included in the C.C.A. Woodsmanship Leaders Guide) will help you do it. Get a copy. You might also look at a copy of "Acclimatizing" by Steve Van Matre (also available through the C.C.A.).

Will you help? PLEASE.


