## R O P E S C O U R S E S A F E T Y

Editor's Note: the following article was submitted by one of OCA's two Commercial Members specializing in ropes course training. Camp Directors may also wish to contact the Canadian Ropes Course Co. Inc., P.O. Box 693, St. Catharines, Ont. L2R 6Y3, (416) 984-8797.

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In recent months I have received many calls and letters from organized camps regarding ropes course safety, construction techniques, equipment and materials, standards, etc. I feel that with the rapid growth of ropes course in camping applications that I should respond through the Ontario Camping Association newsletter.

As I'm sure you are aware, a rapidly growing number of Canadian camps have built "ropes courses". Through both the on-going efforts of Alan Hale's National Safety Network and the Project Adventure 15-Year Safety Study we know that ropes courses can be operated with enviable safety records. However. we are also aware that safety issues such as "home-built" components, out-of-date construction techniques, lack of comprehension instructor training, and unauthorized access have all resulted in a number of very serious injuries.

Project Adventure Canada (PAC) was recently established as a non-profit educational organization.

It has developed internationally recognized construction and training standards and textbooks which dramatically reduce the risk of ropes course operations to levels comparable to a physical education class or camp recreational games program. In addition, Ziplines, a quarterly publication, provides an international network (Australia, Canada, Europe, New Zealand, Singapore and U.S.A.) for the exchange of ideas by organizations and individuals who utilize the Challenge Ropes Course in educational, recreational or therapeutic settings.

I believe that the entire adventure learning industry will benefit by collective efforts to ensure that camp directors receive the latest and safest in adventure programs. Best wishes in the upcoming camping season.


