Stan Wild, a member of the Archives Committee, has prepared the following interesting analysis for this Newsletter:

EVERYTHING COSTS MORE NOWADAYS..... EVEN AT CAMP

Among the latest treasures received by the Archives is a copy of the above is the disparity between the financial Report of Camp milk and butter prices. Potatoes, from the year 1918. We amused ourfrom the year 1918. We amused ourselves comparing some of the costs ed their value in proportion. with current camping, and we felt that the results may be of interest to you. Some of the equipment prices are also revealing. Tents at

Camp fees amounted to \$15,155.00 and from this amount they made a profit.

The biggest items on their budget then (as now) were salaries, \$1,410.00...Food \$1,763.96 and Equipment \$1,147.77. The Cook in those days earned \$165.00 for the season, the Second Cook \$93.33, total wages for all of the kitchen staff \$478.28. (Some camps presently report paying their Chefs (note upgrading) several thousand dollars for the season. Ah, for the good old days!)

A breakdown of some of the food used is also of interest :- Butter at 40¢ - 48¢ per lb. was expensive even then; Milk at 30¢ PER GALLON was a real bargain... Eggs at 42¢ per dozen then, have not increased their value very much, considering that Man has not yet found a way to get Hens to lay more than once a day. If things followed the example of milk prices we should now be paying about \$3.50 per dozen for eggs. One interesting point in the above is the disparity between 13¢ per lb. then, have not increased their value in proportion.

Some of the equipment prices are also revealing. Tents at \$26.11, dessert spoons at \$1.50 per dozen, mattresses at \$2.47, beds at \$4.05, an alarm clock at \$2.50, 16 ft. canoes for \$43.00 each, serving platters at 50¢, all provide an interesting picture of costs in the OLD DAYS.....

One last comment, in 1918 it cost just 8½¢ (average) per meal, 25½¢ per day...and they ate well, very well.....
