A big town, a Junior High School student and a young child with Down Syndrome. An unlikely friendship, right? Well, maybe 20 years ago, but in today's age friendships like this one happen every summer at Camp Reena.

In 1988, I attended Reena's new integrated camp program along with 20 other nondisabled teens, 12-15 years of age. We were introduced to the great feeling of being on a peer level relationship with disabled children our same age. It was fantastic! - a growing and learning experience for all involved. Whether it was helping a new friend tie his shoe or assisting another to participate at a specialty area, integration was the way to go.

As a camper at Reena, I was instantly hooked on this new experience. It was so rewarding, not only for myself and the non-disabled campers, but for those with special needs as well. I learned as much that summer as one can learn at school or from a book. It wasn't taught to me by the staff either. I learned just from being around campers on a daily basis participating various programs with them.

Sure, I was a little nervous at first, but within just a few days I forgot about any disabilities that any of the campers may have had. I looked at it as though, "Well, any 14 year old will act that way."

If more camps would open their doors to kids with special needs, I am confident that their programs would be even more enjoyable and meaningful for all concerned. Let's integrate together!

Therefore, it was decided to do a telephone survey of approximately half of the camp members. A sincere thank you to the Directors and Regional Representatives who made these calls during March and April: Patti Thom, Liz Greenway, Mykl Greenbloom, Jessica Breski, Brian Edey, Romman and Rick John Pearse.

For the most part you told that the Conference Committees in the past have done an excellent job of providing a worthwhile. educational event. told us to avoid repetition and to provide new and innovative speakers programmes. We'll do our best! You can be assured that all of your programme suggestions of topics and speakers have been passed on to the appropriate committee members.

Several of you commented that late January is not an ideal time to attend a con-

ference because Senior Staff are often busy at school and some camps do not hire their staff until later in the year. appreciate this problem, but the reality is that to stage an event of our size with a lot of programme choices and many exhibitors, we require a large hotel. But since we are registering hundreds not thousands, the hotels will only cater to us in their less busy time. They are not willing to give us the necessary space in late February or March, prime convention time.

We are also aware that many camp directors are teachers. May we suggest that many school boards are willing to give time off to staff to attend suitable educational events. Our programme would certainly meet the criteria. Why not give it a try?

THE GREEN SCENE

How many times have you said when throwing something in the garbage that you were throwing something "out" or "away"? Unfortunately, we all now know that there's no such thing as our garbage simply going "away", and the current garbage crisis in the City of Toronto is a good example of this.

don't even have satisfaction of blaming the mess on anyone else, especially if we look ourselves and see our own daily contributions to it. What about our camps? Are they also producing a lot of garbage that will end up in some landfill site that was once a natural area, or that once was productive farmland? Are our camps role-modelling to our campers ways to live in a more responsible way in terms of garbage reduction?

Recycling is an excellent habit for your camp to get into, but this must occur once waste has been produced at camp. There are many ways to reduce the amount of waste produced at camp in the first place. In previous Green Scene columns we have discussed composting as a way to reduce the of volume garbage going to the dump. What about all packaging that comes with our camp supplies? At a time of year when many camps are still involved in purchasing those lastminute supplies for summer, let's take a quick look at some areas around camp where packaging and garbage can be reduced.

In the kitchen, are you ordering any pre-packaged desserts, paper or foam cups or plates, and individual servings of butter, sugar, jam, peanut butter, etc.? Are there alternative ways that would mean less garbage being trucked out of camp each week? The garbage crisis is teaching us that it is worth the extra effort involved in washing reusable dishes and putting away leftover peanut butter and jam, even in a day camp setting where drinks or lunches are the only meals served. This is a great visual message to send to our campers as we surrounded eat by our beautiful natural camp setting.

What about tripping food? Many of the major suppliers of freeze-dried or otherwise convenient packages of trip food do use a great deal of plastic and foil. Are there alternative ways supplying tasty easy-to-pack food for your trips? Sturdy, re-sealable containers do break open as easily as plastic bags, and refillable ketchup and mustard "squeezies" are more fun to use than biting and tearing at those individual plastic wrappers anyway! Isn't it strange that we diligently "pack out" so much garbage from the wilderness areas only to end up dumping it somewhere else afterwards?

Each area at camp can be examined for the amount of needless packaging it uses. Are cleaning supplies each individually wrapped, or do they come in bulk? Is the toilet paper you stock wrapped in a lot of needless plastic, or does it

come shipped to you in a less wasteful box? Does your camp operate a tuck shop? If so, are there ways for you to reduce the amount of candy wrappers and bags that end up in the local landfill site (even if they aren't being littered all over camp)?

If you haven't already done your camp's ordering for the summer yet, then why not take a few minutes to think about the amount of packaging involved in the various alternatives from which you can choose? Granted, plastic packages and disposabled do seem to make life easier and less complicated at camp. However, as shown to me by some signs I recently saw on front lawns near Orillia which read "WE DON'T WANT TORONTO'S GARBAGE", it will be a whole lot more complicated for us and campers in the future if we do not start making some changes now. And like anything at camp, the extra effort is worth it!!!


