Summer Camp: A Fun Recreational Challenge For All

As we approach the summer months, many of us are thinking about our children and what they would enjoy. We also ponder what types of learning experiences our children could achieve and what is the best choice for them. For most parents, these decisions are difficult. For those parents with a disabled child in their family, it is all the more difficult to decide where he/she would be best placed to have fun and participate in a learning environment. It is true that they could place their children in a segregated recreational summer program where they could play and grow with other disabled children, but this may only

reinforce thoughts that they are disabled. Or, the parent could try to locate a summer camp for nondisabled children and see if the camp director would be willing to accept the child in the program. Playing with other children is one of the most valuable experiences he or she will ever take part in. The disabled child will learn how to react and interact with the majority of nondisabled children, and thus be socially ready to participate in the real world.

As a person with cerebral palsy, I know what it was like to be taught in an elementary school for the disabled, and then go to a summer camp for the disabled. I came out of both institutions being fairly immature. This was because I was not exposed to children who were not disabled and I did not know how nondisabled children were supposed to act. I only learning began social skills when I attended an integrated high school and summer camp where I could see how to behave.

Children, be they physically or mentally challenged, have a great opportunity in enrolling in a regular camping program. Don't worry about the child being accepted by others. Campers enjoy campers, and they, in most cases, are willing to help.

REVISIONS TO DAY CAMP STANDARDS .

As you know, the Day Camp Standards are being revised. The format and some of the questions are the same as our recently revised Guidelines For Accreditation for residential camps. There are, however, some additions and changes that are necessary due to differences in the day camp situation.

At this stage in the revision process, the Standards Committee is planning to send a copy of the Draft Revisions to <u>all day camp</u> <u>members</u> so that these members can revise the proposed standards during the summer.

All members will receive a copy of the final draft in the fall and an invitation to participate in an Open Meeting to discuss the standards before the revised Guidelines for Accreditation for day camps is put to the entire membership for approval at our Annual General Meeting in January, 1992.

However, any member who is interested in receiving a copy of the revisions this spring is welcome to call, write, or fax the OCA office and a copy will be sent to them. Comments and suggestions from all members are welcomed at any time.

The Epilepsy Association, Metro Toronto, is a nonprofit organization dedicated to providing information, support, and advocacy to people with epilepsy and their families.
