L E T ' S I N T E G R A T E T O G E T H E R !

Last autumn in the Globe and Mail, Michael Valpy writing of William A. Dimma, deputy chairman of Royal LePage Ltd., quotes, "Ten or fifteen years ago, corporate ethics was a 'MEGO' topic - "My Eyes Glaze Over", but not today, and not likely ever again." Valpy continues, "To illustrate, Mr. Dimma said that, only a generation ago, conventional wisdom was that the only responsibility of management was to maximize value to the shareholder. That view today, he said, is nearly obsolete."

Similarly, we can write that until recently, the subject of integration of children with disabilities into mainstream camps has been a 'MEGO' topic, but not today, and not likely ever again. Credit is owed to the efforts of the OCA Integration Sub-Committee, and the editors of the OCAsional News who have kept this issue in front of the OCA reader.

Integration is becoming the norm and more camps are accepting the responsibility of children with disabilities. I can speak first-hand about Camps Ekon, Glen Mhor, Iona, John Island, Kakeka, Mini-Yo-We and Robin Hood. Here, campers with disabilities are accepted as persons first: they sleep with their peers, not apart from them; they go canoe outtripping together, etc. Children are exposed to appropriate behaviours and interactions; able children learn that they do not have to be perfect to be accepted. It is this kind of leadership which families of children with disabilities have been looking for. Write the parents of a nine-year-old daughter:

"This was (her) first experience in socializing outside of school. For the first time she was independent of her family and she participated in activities that she usually only observed. It was her first experience with the outdoors... I think the experience made her feel like 'one of the kids'... The week of not having to worry about how to keep her busy was relaxing. My husband and I had a second honeymoon. Our son appreciated the only child. being although he missed her terribly. Thank you. And we thought no one cared and that we would have to keep (her) alone."

From parents such as these, the theme of increased self considence and independence is recurrent. Yet is this the any different from developmental needs of all children? Parents write that children with disabilities should not only be involved in typical activities, but also in typical environments. My own son his first camping had experience at John Island in July. Never before did he eat more enthusiastically, dress more promptly or play more vigorously. But I recognized that Tristan is valued and respected by others: all parents deserve as much.

Rewards are also available to the whole camp body: "Children from R.E.A.C.H.

(for the Rainbow) enriched the experience of Iona for . both staff and campers". "Ekon exists to help leaders to further develop leadership skills and a sense of responsibility -R.E.A.C.H. and the challenges of some campers help us to achieve this goal"... "Demonstrates for Kakeka staff, campers and others the compassion and care individuals can have for others. Very positive. A good experience!" Of a camper with autism at Robin Hood, his counsellor notes that "the members of the group think (he's) a 'radical dude'. He is a super kid!"

Leadership has been assumed not only by religiously affiliated camps, but also by private, agency and municipal camps. I hope that the reader's eyes have NOT glazed over; and that more camp owners and directors regard integration as a responsibility and an opportunity.

STANDARDS NEWS

Do You Know Where Your Standards Binder Is?

All member camps received a green or blue binder to hold the revised Guidelines for Accreditation that were ratified by the membership at our Annual General Meeting last January. These Guidelines contain all the questions that must be answered as part of your accreditation visit. The Guidelines also contain valuable information that should be of assistance to all camp directors every Keep your binder year. close at hand for easy reference and be sure to take it to camp for the summer.

Standards Visits and Ontario Regulation 242/84

Every year there are a few questions in the <u>Guidelines</u> for Accreditation that come to the attention of the Standards Committee when we review the Answer Sheets. This year, there are two questions that we would like to comment on.

CS24 (page 2.4) Is there a written fire emergency procedure posted and/or available to all staff and campers?

P3 (page 4.3) Does the camp have written instructions for emergency and operational procedures that shall be used in the event of a waterfront emergency?

In each case, Ontario Regulation 242/84 (s. 11 and s. 36) is quite specific that written procedures are required by law. They are also required for your protection and to assist you and your staff in providing a safe camping experience for all campers.

The Standards Committee encourages all directors to review their written emergency procedures every year and to ensure that all staff and campers are familiar with these procedures.

HOTEL TRANSPORTATION: A SMORGASBORD OF CHOICE

CAR A recent report indicated that all roads lead to the Sheraton Centre - unfortunately many other people know that as well - and often use them. Parking (and plenty of it) is available below City Hall (across the street). If you must drive, then you must park and the City Hall Parking Lot is the place to do it downtown.

A driving/parking alternative exists at the Yorkdale Shopping Centre (Allen Rd and HWY 401) where, before 9:30 AM, you may enter their lot and park all day for \$3.00. A subway ride brings you right to the Hotel (see University Line/Subway). For those parking at Yorkdale after 9:30 AM, the parking is free for the day.

SUBWAY

University Line - to Osgoode Station walk east on Queen Street to the Hotel Yonge Line - to Queen St Station walk west on Queen Street to the Hotel

GO TRAIN Take the GO Train to Union Station . From there walk above ground or in the comfort of underground tunnels to the Hotel (7 min walk). Shopping along the way is permitted but don't be late for sessions!

SKATING/SWIMMING Neither of these transportation methods is recommended for arrival/ departure at the Hotel but the City Hall rink is right across the street and an indoor/outdoor pool (heated) is located inside/outside the Hotel. Skates and suits are therefore recommended (not both at the same time!).

LUGGAGE STORAGE This free Hotel service may be of interest to those guests adding other plans to their Conference time visit to Toronto.


The challenges are great but the rewards are worthwhile as we continue to MAKE A DIFFER ENCE in the lives of the campers, staff and parents depending on us!


COUNSELLOR'S CORNER A HELPFUL ADVICE COLUMN FOR THE CAMPING CONFERENCE GOER Dear Couns;

SIMPLE THINGS THAT MAKE A DIFFERENCE AS A DELEGATE

BE A BUDDY

Seek out a buddy before or at Conference time. Whether you are a rookie or a veteran you can make a great deal of difference to your buddy and you will see the Conference through a different pair of eyes. You are the only one that gets you involved.

ATTEND SESSIONS

Getting to the Conference is only half the effort. How many times have you wished that a camper would do more than just come to Camp, simply to stand on the sidelines. Go to the sessions, ask questions, stimulate discussion and make the session pertinent to your needs.

MEET IN THE CONCOURSE LEVEL

Between every session and during informal times, there is a great deal going on in the Registration /Hospitality Area. Gather there to meet your friends, old and new; to see displays; to check for messages. Use the message board to contact your friends and to make special arrangements in the Registration Area - at the heart of things.

DON'T SMOKE

It is distracting and unhealthy. We have stopped short of declaring a Smoke Free Conference but if you must smoke, plan to do it outside of sessions (large and small), outside of the Registration Area and outside of meal areas. In fact, plan to do it outside, if possible!

WEAR YOUR NAMETAG

We are adopting a different style of nametag this year. It will be large, legible and necklace style attached to a neck cord for easy transfer when you change clothes but it must be worn to make a difference.

STAY IN THE HOTEL

A great deal of the Conference 'difference' comes outside of sessions and regular Conference events. Stick around in the Hotel with your friends and associates and make the three days of Conference association truly effective.

BE A GOOD BUYER

O.C.A. exhibitors are here to serve your needs during Conference time. Do a little homework and take advantage of equipment displays, face-to-face contacts and special Conference prices. Plan to make Friday as effective an exhibit day as possible.

THINK GREEN

Care about your Camp all year round and care about the earth as well. Plan to take or make copies only when you can't remember it, you can't write it down or you can't share someone else's. Don't drive to the Conference, share a ride or use public transit. Don't waste meal tickets, turn them in or give them away to a Conference volunteer.
