With this in mind here's a reminder to camp directors of the new procedure to have your camp approved by the Ministry of Health.

Excerpt from Ontario Regulation 242/84.

Notice of Camp Opening

Every person who intends to operate a recreational camp for the first time shall give written notice of his intention to do so to the medical officer of health at least sixty days before the camp is to be opened.

Where an operator intends to open a recreational camp that has been closed for a period exceeding thirty days, the operator shall notify the medical officer of health of the proposed opening at least fourteen days prior to the re-opening of the camp.

If your operation extends throughout the year you need not follow this procedure. But it would be good P.R. to inform the local medical officer of health that you are moving into your summer program.

When the local M.O.H. sends an inspector a copy of his report will be left with you as proof of his visit. There will be no license issued, instead a copy of the report will be requested as part of the O.C.A. accreditation visit.

I'm sure that you are all gearing up for another great summer and I would like to wish you a safe and successful season.

"DO TELL"

NIGHT HIKES - PART 11

PREPARATION

1. Scout your route. Know exactly where you intend to go with deviations from established trails decided well before hand. Know how to 'bail out' on alternate routes should this become necessary.

2. Know your group. The night means different things to different people and none of your planned activities should threaten a campers sensibilities nor should you ask a group to do something which they may have difficulty handling.

3. Prepare yourself. Gather all the items you will need for night exercises and take along a flashlight for emergency use.

4. Prepare your group. Let them know what is expected of them and the importance of full participation.

THE NIGHT HIKE

1. Your hike away from the lights of camp should be in a line with participants spread out and as quiet as possible.

2. Your manner at all times should be quiet and relaxed, almost secretive. The response of the group will soon be the same.

3. The exercises that you choose should flow well from one activity to the next.

4. Time will pass quickly but you should not stay out too long unless fully prepared to do so.

5. End the hike before interest wanes.

ENDING THE HIKE

1. Gather the group before you return to lights and activity. Summarize briefly and draw out reactions from the group.

2. Sometimes the hike can shift easily into a general discussion about other things which affect the group.

IDEAS FOR NIGHT HIKE ACTIVITIES

1. Firefly Talks:-

Capture insects or fungus with phosphorescence (cool chemical light) and gather in a fairy circle for secret talks.

2. Trust falls:-

In the centre of a close circle of people one person stands stiffly and tips against the circle wall and is tipped back and forth "trusting" his fellows to hold him up.

3. Colour "Cone" fusion:-

Daytime colour discrimination is the work of cone cells in the eye which do not function in the low light levels of the night. Rod cells distinguish shades of light primarily in black and white.

4. Sounds Like ...:-

For fifteen seconds we will make no sound. Don't rustle clothes...just listen! How many sounds did you hear? From what direction? How far away? 5. Winter Green Moonglow:-

There is a chemical in winter green lifesavers that emits light when it reacts with nitrogen after you bite into it. The sparks are fun to see and taste great too!
